

In 2012 Ekaterina graduated from Russian State University of Cinematography (VGIK) as a producer. During the years 2014 - 2015 she was studying creative advertising at the University of Arts (UAL) in London. Gradually, she began to work not only on ads, but also art projects. In 2016 her love for contemporary art and the desire to develop art skills helped her to enter the Fine Art course at British Higher School of Art&Design (BHSAD) / University of Hertfordshire in Moscow. Nowadays, she is focused on her art practice that explores the materialization of emotions in the form of objects and installations. For instance, Ekaterina is interested in the relationship between the body and pain, transforming fabrics with the aid of heat and colouring. The anatomy, psychosomatic and natural phenomena are her main sources of inspiration.

Curator Review: Melancholy

In this detailed work, cellular-like layers, evoke a level of intimacy between the viewer and the piece. Artist Ekaterina Adelskaya successfully expresses a solemnity via the title and in the rich yet muted tones presented. The flat and torn edges, are divided by various hues and appear to move in a circular manner, towards the inner, darker perforation. 

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Maurizio Battifora Biography:

As a child, Battifora drew and painted everything he could. Much of his inspiration comes from baroque and renaissance painters and Gustav Klimt, in particular. Battifora is fascinated by the exaggerated motion, drama and tension in the old masters works. By 2008, Battifora's own empirical and intuitive development drove his evolution as an artist, to that of a pointillist. His main body of work consists of large dots of acrylic on canvas, requiring immense discipline and is more graphic and bold then Seurat's pointillism of an earlier age. Working in series and medium to large size canvasses, he has participated in solo and group exhibits. Battifora's paintings are in private collections in the US and Europe. He has recently relocated to Los Angeles. "I want to communicate directly with the viewer as if they are part of the painting not simply a spectator. I listen to opinions and greatly appreciate those who contemplate my work. To me that's when Art closes the circle. My idea touches someone else's soul and then comes back to me with their own interpretation."

Curator Review: Ladylike Wolf

This intriguing painting by artist Maurizio Battifora, explores the Little Red Riding Hood narrative. The human subjects, appear to be taking part in an adjacent, modern 'tale' of their own in this piece. 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Andrea Cook Biography:

Sharing the Inner Light. Artist Andrea Cook creates art that resonates on many levels. As a multimedia artist, she specializes in textiles with mixed media elements, ceramic, sculpture, and painting. She plays with texture, pattern and repetition to create unity in each unique piece. Andrea employs her imagination and inner light to create a connection with her viewer. Born and raised in Dallas, TX, Andrea discovered her artistic desires early on and received a lot of encouragement to follow her dreams. "My first childhood classes were drawing, watercolor, and ceramics. I continued art through high school, where I enjoyed metals, ceramics, and printmaking. The high school that I attended had many art options, and I have always loved exploring new media." "My desire was to make one-of-a-kind, original art," explains Andrea. "I went on to attend UT El Paso, where I fell in love with sculpture. I received a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree in Sculpture and Painting." After college, Andrea continued to explore different artistic endeavors. "I was working on large scale, soft sculpture installation," she explains. "It was at this same time that I started the 'Garden of Roses' as a large, soft sculpture, temporary installation." The 'Garden of Roses' project is made of hand dyed, painted, or pure fabrics made from canvas, burlap, cotton, and muslin. The fabric is ripped into strips and dipped into an archival quality glue. Then, she forms the fabric into rose designs varying in color, shape, and size. Andrea would then mount them on canvas or panel. "I love for my art to be beautiful, colorful, and textural working with pattern and repetition to create unity," says Andrea of her creative process. "I like for my work to create an illusion and for it to connect to the viewer. I try to bring out my own imagination and inner light in each piece. I always have an idea of how I want an art piece to go, but I try to let the work happen naturally." She continues to work with a variety of techniques. Exploration, risk taking, change, and growth have all contributed to the techniques that she uses in her work today. "Sharing my inner light, passion, and imagination is my way of making important connections."

Curator Review: Garden of Roses #146 Laguna Beach Boardwalk

This abstract scape of interlacing roses, was created by artist Andrea Cook. Her spirited use of various tonalities ranging from white to blue and yellow to gray, effectively gives depth and definition to her intentional 'lines'. The varying shapes merge together and create a collage-esque vision, of a balanced 'horizon' in the distance. - E.E. Jacks

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Andrew K. Currey Biography:

For the past several years, I have used images from history to begin a discussion in my drawings about the constantly evolving Internet culture and its effects on society. The name, Sepulcher, refers to an area that is carved out of wood or stone to house the glorified dead or some sacred artifact. Today, payphones and public telephones, stand among the streets of cities in disrepair and disuse. They stand as contemporary ruins of our technological progression — their metal frames serve as alcove-like-altars to shield their lifeless form from the elements. I have placed the payphone in an old stone alcove ornate with gold to highlight its nostalgia and glorified irrelevancy in this new digital age. Andrew K. Currey received his Bachelors in Fine Arts at the University of North Texas in Denton, Texas, and later received his Masters in Fine Arts from Otis College of Art and Design. He was the 2014 Artist-In-Residence of Shankill Castle in Paulstown, Ireland. Andrew currently lives and works in Los Angeles, CA.

Curator Review: Sepulcher

Evocative and curious within the borders of a gilded frame, a phone booth sits. This meticulously detailed rendering by artist Andrew K. Currey, demonstrates his brilliant artistic skills and technique. This startlingly illusionistic work, has a monumental quality to it and the immediacy it evokes, gives it a mindful longevity. - E.E. He is strongly influenced by environment and the experience of our predecessors, through clay, fantasy, and personal mythology Desmone explores culture in a post digital era. Desmone explores the purpose of existence and the confusion that lies in that search. He uses his materials to describe facets of life and expressions of emotion and experience, responding to the essence of being human and what that means as our society progresses. Desmone received his BFA in Ceramics from the University of the Arts in 2017 and has since been published both locally and internationally.



Curator Review: Habitual Repetition

Artist Luke Desmone has created a incredibly 'weightless' piece, in its feeling of freedom and open expression. The exaggerated form with its abstract 'hatch' patterns and bright color, juxtaposed with the elegant and simplified shape beneath, perhaps reflects, on that individual and drastically varied subconscious 'totem', one gravitates towards for familial, or group identity. - E.E. 

Tony Gangitano Biography:

Born -- Brooklyn NY Lives -- San Diego CA. Tony received a Bachelors of Landscape Architecture from the University of Georgia and returned to work in New York City. He moved to San Diego CA to study art. Independent study/travel in many countries led Tony to Italy, where he lived and worked as a sculptor for two years. He interned in ceramic and bronze with sculptor Alberto Ricci in Rome, then did internships and independent study of stone carving at Studio Sem and bronze casting at Tommasi Foundry, both in Pietra Santa, Italy. Upon returning to California, he pursued a Masters of Fine Art at San Diego State University. There the love of carving stone and casting bronze took a back seat to less traditional materials, which he incorporated into more conceptual sculptures and site-specific installations. Tony's work was exhibited in group shows, two-person shows, and featured artist shows until the year 2000, when he took a hiatus from sculpture and focused on environmental landscape architecture design projects. In 2015, he re-emerged as a well-seasoned, creative, high energy, conceptually oriented mixed media sculptor. His current work is fresh and exciting, incorporating thoughtful concepts and new materials. Artist Statement: Fine Art is my first language. I am fortunate to have been raised by artists and creative craftsmen, and a mother who excused my inherent eccentric behavior by saying in a Brooklyn accent, "Its ok... He's an Artist." My work is about the integration of aesthetic form and emotional and intellectual content. The evolution of my art has progressed on confluent paths. Traditional figurative style merged with the abstract, which then incorporated conceptual mixed-media elements. My current emphasis is abstract figurative in stone and bronze, incorporating objects and materials that represent aspects of the human condition. I use archetypal images that communicate the essential commonalities of the human experience. These images, combined with the juxtaposition and dialogue between figures, shapes, and materials, provoke visual, visceral, and intellectual interaction with the viewer.

Curator Review: Hermit

Sculpted with bold edges and firm intention, this alabaster piece resembles an abstract mountain range. Centered on the stone is a smooth vertical shape, that breaks up the uneven ground. The size and placement of this element, successfully conveys grand scale within a limited space. Artist Tony Gangitano effectively expresses singularity, through this natural medium. - E.E. Jacks

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Lori Horowitz Biography:

Art reflects the conditions and emotions of life we experience through image and form. Creating art based on society, political issues and the environment is the premise of my work. I am drawn to architectural construction vs. deconstruction in the environment and the psychological components behind the scenes. In the series "Kings Park Psychiatric Hospital", I explore the relationship with the past and present and have researched the changes over time. These photos capture decomposition of the structures within nature as well as the nature of confinement and debilitation in the institution. This body of work archives the current conditions of Kings Park / Nissequogue Park site for the future so we remember its' past history. These structures are currently being demolished, many of which are already gone. Through my sensitivity to subject matter, I strive to expose the beauty of decay, and aging. Lori received a BFA in Visual Arts from S.U.N.Y. Purchase. She has been involved with teaching, designing and creating art to promote the spread of culture and creative expression. I have educated students, created sculpture and multi- media artwork as well as theatrical sets for TV /theater and film. Throughout her career, she continues to produce sculptures and paintings, accumulating a large body of artwork while showing my work in galleries and museums. In 2013, she started a community initiative on Long Island opening a not-for-profit artspace, "Studio 5404" bringing cultural arts to Long Island, NY. After a successful three and a half years, she closed the gallery 2016 to concentrate on her own artwork and curating shows to share with the public. Horowitz's process of working with photography, wire, papier mache, copper and painting shows her proficiency with materials. She has been experimenting with copper and its' properties combing painting along with wire sculpture and theatrical lighting. Ultimately, she has developed a technique "Painting with Fire" where images are burned into copper with the appearance of two way mirrors changing significantly based on lighting. The light bounces off the copper pieces reflecting a strong image while the mesh shows a translucent after image. She burns images into the surface of reflective copper creating subjects that are then sculpted and manipulated with intricate detail. Lighting and shadow play a key role in this innovative, figurative analysis is a socio/ psycho study that brings light to the attention seekers and the overlooked of our society.

Curator Review: Inside Out

Eye-opening and powerful, this creation of copper, bronze and mixed media, exudes a life of its own. The figurative element framing the window, is wonderfully compelling and effectively reflects the tenor of the title. Artist Lori Horowitz allows this work to evolve in the viewers mind, via her conscientiously placed provocative images, of empty door frames and darkened halls. - E.E. Jacks


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Nicholas Kozis Biography:


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Paula Prager Biography:



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
Hilary Saner Biography:

Why paint? To me, it comes down to trying to live and respond to life, to people, to experience as authentically and truthfully as possible. Painting is prayer – it saves my life day by day, as a meditative and spiritually transformative discipline; the final "object" (or painting) is almost incidental to the long and repetitive journey through the stations of Beginning, Doubt, Failure and ultimately Resolution. I paint on a variety of supports, from canvas to wood, to particle board to heavily worked paper. I often create these supports layer by layer in a series of random, flowing expressive actions - look, add, respond, glue, remove, attach; again; again... - before insisting on the painted image on the final surface offered up to the viewer. This is to try and capture and model my sense that this is what life demands of each of us - insistent agency and presence - over and against and informed by its seemingly random, often turbulent flow. I practice towards an increasing clarity of perception and fearless engagement with the medium, that will allow me to say (with Rilke), "Look - a leaf, a dancer, a human being, a carrot, an oak tree, a window," but to say them in such a way that the objects or people themselves never dreamed of existing so intensely.

Curator Review: Frozen State

This fantastic piece by artist Hilary Saner, experiments with texture, color, and movement. The sharper yet more subtle background 'lines', gives a curious narrative to this work. Saner takes the viewer through a 'landscape' of uneven shapes, that merge into speckles of paint. 'Frozen State', most certainly stirs the mind into an inquisitive state.




